1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Introduction

Shree Shree Gourgobind Girls' College, Imphal was established in 1985 under the leadership of Shree Koijam Brajagopal Singh. It is located at Khurai Sajor Leikai, Imphal East and is the only Girls' College in the north eastern side of Imphal East, Manipur. The College was established with the mission, 'To impart holistic education to girl students and empower them with the knowledge, competence and skill to make them self reliant, enlightened and socially committed citizens of the country'. The College has a total area of 1.80 acres, and being located in a semi urban area provides an ideal atmosphere where girl students are groomed to serve the society. The College is a government aided College, affiliated to Manipur University and is also recognized by the UGC under section 2(f) and 12(b) of the UGC Act 1956. The college offers different programmes under Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.), Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.), Bachelor of Physical Education and Sports (BPES) and has nineteen departments.

1. The College is ideally located in a semi urban area with a spacious area of 1.80 acres and is the only girls' College in the northeastern side of Imphal East.
2. The teachers of the College are well qualified.

3. The result of the students enrolled is quite impressive with many students securing top ranks in the University exam conducted by Manipur University.
4. The students of the College have been forerunners in the fields of sports and other extra- curricular activities.
5. Administrative Block, Library, Pond, Wi-fi, Solar Panels, ICT rooms, Seminar Hall, Girls common room are some of the infrastructural strengths of the College.
6. The College also has various committees and cells viz. Academic Committee, Examination Committee, IQAC, NSS Unit, Women's Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, ST,SC,OBC and Minority Cell, Alumni Association which serve as the backbone for the smooth perusal of the College.
7. The College has an active feedback mechanism so that improvement in the fields of teaching learning and administrative machinery could be made.

Institutional Weakness

1. The College being a newly government aided College needs to focus on its infrastructural lacunae.
2. The College needs to construct an auditorium and also increase the number of classrooms.
3. The classrooms of the College need to be equipped with modern teaching and learning gadgets.

2. The teaching and non-teaching staffs of the College though contributing their best level for the upliftment of human resource of the state are not given adequate emoluments like monthly salary.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to Manipur University and offers programmes for B.A., B.Sc., B.Com., and BPES across nineteen departments and twenty five programmes. Therefore, the College strictly follows the curriculum, norms and patterns of academic calendar and examination system mandated by Manipur University. The Academic Committee of the College along with the IQAC and Heads of various departments ensures various measures for the effective delivery of the prescribed curriculum. The College therefore endeavours to introduce young students to a wide variety of courses which conforms to the issues relevant to

Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics so that students are capable enough to also prepare themselves for the exam of life and responsibly contribute to the society. Apart from the systematic delivery of the prescribed curriculum, students are exposed to first hand experiences of what is taught in the classroom through awareness programmes, group discussions, seminars, study tours and field visits. Work assignments, internal assessments and semester exams also serve as a mechanism for evaluating the outcomes of the prescribed curriculum. In the techniques adopted for teaching, the use of ICT tools by the teachers has made teaching learning more engaging and effective.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The Bachelors of Arts, Science and Commerce introduced in the College consist of six semesters over a duration of three years. The College being a part of Manipur University follows the Academic Calendar of the University and evaluates the performances of the students for measuring the attainment of course outcomes and programme outcomes through internal assessment tests and tutorial classes. Mediums like Google Meet and WhatsApp provide an instant query/response platform for both the students and the teacher.

Prior to the beginning of formal classes, students are made to attend an induction programme where they are introduced to a variety of information which pertains to courses, rules and regulations, time table, academic calendar and examination structure. From the current session 2022-23, NEP2020 has been implemented in the College.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has a Research and Extension Committee to consult and refer in research and extension activities. The committee counsels and gives awareness on publication ethics. The college has various publications of research articles, books and book chapters across various subjects from Science, Arts and Commerce. The faculties of the College have also communicated for Research project. The college regularly organizes workshops and seminars.

The National Service Scheme (NSS) Cell also organizes various programmes in collaboration with government, non-government organization and local clubs.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

There are 19 classrooms of which 5 are smart classrooms well equipped with slide projectors. The College has constructed an ICT room where students and teachers are given access to the computers. The College has a separate laboratory for Chemistry, Zoology, Physics, Botany and Environmental Science. Facilities like common room for the students which provide access to various indoor games like chess, table tennis, carom give ample opportunities for students to judiciously use their free time. The College has a Multi-purpose Hall and a Seminar room well equipped with facilities like projectors. The library of the College is partially automated. The Library of Shree Shree Gourgobind Girls' College was established in 1985 and caters to the academic needs staffs and students of the college in the field of Science, Arts, Commerce and Physical Education and Sports. It has a collection of 3000 books-text reference and rare books.

Student Support and Progression

The College under the IQAC and its sub cells encourages each student to avail scholarships given by different agencies of the government and non-governmental agencies. For this the Academic Committee of the College gives information and updates of the different scholarships from time to time. The College has a Grievance Redressal Cell under which Anti Ragging Cell and Sexual Harassment Cell exist and a Women Cell. These cells look into the complaints, doubts and grievances. Fortunately, the college does not have any such cases till date. The students are also made to excel in their areas of interests like sports, debates, extempore, quizzes through support and encouragement of the teachers. The members of the Alumni Association of the College actively participate in various activities for the welfare of the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The College is the only girls' college in the North Eastern side of the Imphal East. Since the establishment of the college, it has been under the strict supervision of the efficient Governing Body.

The Principal along with the Vice-Principal and all the Heads of the Departments, Convenors of different Committees and Cells, Head Clerk and her supporting non-teaching staff, play an integral role in implementation of policies and programs for the smooth running of the college. The college has various committees and cells for the development and functioning of the college. The committees are Academic Committee, Finance Committee, Examination Committee, Admission Committee, Infrastructure and Purchase Committee, Yoga, Sports and Cultural Committee, Research and Extension Committee etc. Cells viz., Women's Cell, ST, SC, OBC and Minority Cell, Career Counselling and Guidance Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell. The college also has an Electoral Literacy Club. The college has fully functional NSS Unit. There are also Associations like Teachers Association, Non-teaching Association. Alumni Association, Students Union, Parents Teacher Association.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The College aims not only for the effective delivery of the prescribed curriculum but also aims to shape and mould young girl students to become responsible citizens of the country. To imbibe the values of courage, tolerance and patience, students are made to take part in various annual observances like International Women's Day, Martyrs' Day, Nupi Lan, International Yoga Day, Gandhi Jayanti, Constitution Day to mention a few.

It helps the students in building self-esteem, confidence and leadership skill to become independent thinkers encourages them to plan for their future. Thus, the institution organizes skill development programmes such as food preservation, make-up and Mushroom cultivation trainings which gives the students knowledge and skills making them self-reliant young women.</p>

Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	<p>The College has a full-fledged Manipuri Department offering honours Courses to its Under graduate students. For every commemoration of important events, the state song, Manipur is sung, in Manipuri language, one of the languages recognized under the 8th schedule of the Constitution of India. The Manipuri language is used for commemoration of important state events like Nupi Lan, Irabot Day and Patriot's Day to mention a few. Songs, enactment of plays and life history of important personalities are all done in the Manipuri language. The College also encourages performances of classical dances and other tribal dances during College functions. The students of the College have actively participated in youth festivals organized by Manipur University.</p>

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Our College adopts a strategical planning and proper documentation under the collective supervision of the Principal, the Academic Committee, and the departmental members co-ordinated by the IQAC. Our College follows the Academic Schedule and the Syllabi of Manipur University. As soon as the university issues the annual academic calendar, the internal core committees of our College conducts meeting prior to the beginning of every academic session to structure a broad plan that goes parallel with the schedule and timeline given by the Manipur University.

The following ways are adopted to achieve an effective curriculum delivery:

- Efficient faculty approach is emphasized, therefore, the college makes sure to appoint qualified and efficient teachers. The Institution encourages teachers to participate in Orientation Programs, Refresher Courses, Workshops, Seminars, and Conferences to stay updated on recent trends and innovative teaching/learning methodologies.
- The syllabi are explained and class time-tables are strictly followed to ensure successful delivery of the curriculum. Every department also prepares a Session-plan.
- Teachers also use various platforms like WhatsApp, Zoom Meet and other aids like smart class and projectors apart from the traditional way of teaching.
- Apart from the normal classes, tutorial classes and Expert's lectures are also provided to the students for a thorough understanding of the subjects taught.
- The College Library maintains a good number of resources. The library is partially automated with KOHA software with 2.2.9 version. The library has a collection of 3000 books and provides adequate seat arrangement for readers.

Every department also has a departmental library that provides open access to books and references to the faculties as well. Moreover, the college has an open access Wi-Fi facility so that the students can easily avail the advantage of e-learning and e-books.

- Annual trips to science parks, historical places and monuments are organized to impart practical knowledge and awareness about the subjects that the students are learning.
- The teaching quality is frequently checked and assessed by parameters such as teacher's performance and student's feedback. The following ways are adopted for the Continuous Internal Evaluation:
 - The quantitative assessment is conducted through theoretical and practical examinations majorly. Student's performance is also assessed by various parameters such as average attendance, class-test, quiz, classroom-performance, group discussion, and debates.
 - Regarding the quantitative assessment, the concerned teacher of every department sets questions. Every department takes the responsibility to set questions. The question papers are then submitted to the Examination Committee for smooth conduct of the internal tests. The practical exams are conducted at the college with the presence of an external examiner.

- Annual Day celebrations, cultural programmes, sports, NSS Special and Residential camps and various other programs are also added to enhance the qualitative growth of the students.
- The assessed marks are then maintained and recorded systematically.
- The overall performance of the students is analyzed and checked by the Academic Committee to understand the weak areas in the teaching-learning approach.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

The College follows the curriculum of Manipur University which addresses the issues relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics and to fulfill its vision, the College endeavours to address the above issues through a systematic delivery of the prescribed curriculum.

Gender:

- The Literary Theory section under the Elective Course of English (EnH-507) includes a topic, “Feminism” which focuses on the role of women in society and the feminists’ advocate women to raise their voices through writing. For this, education is used as a powerful weapon by women to empower themselves.
- The Indian Government and Politics paper under the 3rd Semester (303), Unit 3 of the Political Science subject includes a topic entitled, “Women Empowerment”. The chapter discusses the need to empower women for the development of our society at large. The paper also discusses the obstacles that women face in terms of gender bias right from the smallest unit, the family. The various socio political issues of women are analyzed for the different communities of the Indian society taking their customs and cultures into context.
- The Regional Development paper (GF 3rd Semester) under the section, The Manipuri Women and Changing World focuses on the importance of women as preservers of culture and collective identities and how issues concerning violation of human rights and the ability to make choices for themselves should be looked into.

Environment and Sustainability

- The Environmental Science subject is made a compulsory course in the 4th semester (FC-4) to address the issues of environment and sustainability. It emphasizes the importance of protecting the environment for the future generation. The Elective paper, Moral Philosophy (E1-404), Unit 1, “Nature and Scope of Ethics” of the Philosophy subject introduces young students on the importance of upholding moral and

ethical values that are needed to face any obstacles and challenges of life. The upholding of good moral and ethical values makes students contribute effectively to the society.

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

It is important to take a student-centric approach in teaching methods. The teachers emphasize on making their classroom activities more students centric. The college undertakes the following measures to help students to improve their general academic knowledge and skills.

- Group discussions are held for students so that they interact with their fellow students, preparing presentations and assignments, collection of study materials, etc. Study tours, field works, project works, workshops, seminars, hands-on training programmes are the various means through which collaborative learning skills are developed.
- Various academic and co-academic activities/programmes such as debates, essay writing on relevant topics are different ways in which the college encourage critical thinking to the students.
- Seminars and workshops are organized. Tutorial classes are conducted by all the departments.
- Experimental learning is the most approved pedagogy followed by faculties of the college.
- The College has a library and a wifi enabled campus. Access to internet is provided to the students to enhance their knowledge.
- Students are given responsibilities for organizing cultural and sports activities to enhance

leadership qualities and team management.

- Students are encouraged to participate in different activities like blood donation camp, cleanliness and relief and disaster handling programs to inculcate values and social responsibilities among them.

The traditional method of teaching is replaced by student participation in the classroom by asking questions, collaborating in project activities and participative learning to enhance student involvement as a part of problem solving methodology. Students are advised to review lecture at home and work on projects and assignments in the classroom. This provides a great space for peer-to-peer collaboration among the students to complete group projects, debates and practices. It was observed that interaction with students affected a noticeable increase in self confidence among the students.

To make the teaching-learning process more interactive, the college has a separate set up of smart classrooms where audio-visual aids such as projectors are set up for teachers to help the students in developing skills for interactive teaching. Seminars and workshops are conducted so that students are in touch with new developments in various subjects. The faculty members collect materials and learning resources from the internet and use them for teaching purpose. To promote collaborative learning skills, teachers assign powerpoint presentation to the students. Digital-age literacy are taught to students. The college provides internet facilities to all the departments. Internet facilities for students are available in all the departments and in the library. The students get printing and copying facilities free of cost using the college facilities. Materials are downloaded so that the students can use the material to study for their exams. Lecture notes, study materials and assignments are circulated through emails and WhatsApp.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**2.5.1**

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The College conducts Internal Assessment Examinations for all courses throughout the semesters. Heads of Department briefed the students about the evaluation process. Whenever the institution makes any revision in the evaluation process, it is communicated to the teachers in the staff-meetings and the information is displayed on the notice board. Since it is affiliated to Manipur University, it follows its rules and provisions.

For ensuring transparency, notifications are duly displayed in the College notice boards prior to one month regarding the dates, timings for the examinations to be conducted.

After the allotment of marks in the internal examination, the Head of the concerned departments scrutinize the evaluated scripts. Corrected answer scripts of tests and internal examinations are given to the students to enable them to understand the method of evaluation. This gives them a fair idea about the evaluation and to check whether they have rightly answered the questions and they are justly valued. The faculty members discuss the answer scripts with the students in the respective department and necessary suggestions are given for further improvement. The internal assessment mark lists are prepared and sent to the University.

The College has an effective system of Grievances Redressal Cell to address the grievances of the students related to internal assessment marks announced by the College at the end of every semester. The students have no barriers in meeting the authority or any faculty directly to present their grievances. For any mistakes found in the question papers and out of syllabus question, the students can bring it to the notice of the subject teacher concerned. In such cases, full marks will be given to the students.

The students who are not satisfied with their marks can apply to the Grievance Redressal Cell by writing a formal application. Students are free to approach to resolve their queries related to the marks obtained in the internal assessment to the examination committee. The students who are not satisfied with the procedure can meet the Principal of the College. The College authority will take prompt action to such grievances without delay.

Students with any grievances regarding evaluation, may be provided with photocopies for cross checking. The Grievance Redressal Cell with the related grievances is a time-bound and efficient. The Grievances related is dealt in a transparent manner by the concerned authority.

Class teachers/mentors are assigned to maintain a record of attendance, marks and other details of students. Students may not be allowed to appear for the assessments if minimum attendance percentage is not maintained. A verifiable and credible reason for the prolonged absence must be furnished. Re-test may be conducted for a student absentee if the reason for her absence is valid and credible upon verification under special considerations with the approval of the Examination Committee and the Principal.

The college has a mechanism of communication for learning outcomes of programmes and courses for 3-year degree courses of Arts and Science. The courses and syllabus of Science, Arts and Commerce are uploaded in the College website and is available in the concerned departments for the reference of students and teachers. The students and faculties are made aware of its programme and course outcomes in the academic meetings, prospectus, website and also during the orientation programme,

Taking considerations of the desired outcomes, the students are groomed to face the challenges of life, to enable students to be ideal citizens and to make them morally and spiritually healthy. Study materials are provided to the students. Courses on human rights are to inculcate human and moral values. NSS Cell is a part of the institutional structure which undertakes social works and awareness programmes for

sensitizing students on social and moral values such as participating in Youth Festivals of Manipur University, blood donation camps, organizing youth exchange programme, sports and games, etc.

The College regularly evaluates the performances of the students through various methods for measuring the attainment of each of the Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes. The evaluations are provided through University Semester Examinations, College internal assessment examinations, home assignments, quizzes, debates etc. for the performance of the students throughout the year. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college display an overall academic report in the College notice board.

All the HODs of different departments collect the data on student learning outcomes through the documents of the University results. These data are further evaluated and analysed in terms of passing percentage, first division, second division and failed students. Based on the analysis, the HOD identifies the barriers of learning if any in terms of teaching performance of the faculty and quality of the curriculum.

It is observed by the faculty members that a large section of students hesitate to exchange their views in the classroom as well as on other occasions due to their language problem, especially in English. To overcome this problem, programmes like Personality Development, Spoken English etc are regularly conducted. Tutorial classes are provided to the slow learners and economically backward class of students. Weak students are provided tutorial classes for their progression.

Average attainment in evaluation process: The Manipur University evaluates the students of this college for 70 and 30 total marks as external assessment and internal assessment respectively in three years degree courses under the semester system. The internal assessment is evaluated by the College. The internal assignments are given to the students with the purpose that students will find out the best answers and understand the expected objectives of the given assignments.

4.1.1

Response:

Shree Shree Gourgobind Girls' College has an area of about 1.80 acre with adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for the development of Teaching-Learning environment.

The college has sufficient number of classrooms for students of Arts, Science Commerce and Physical Education and Sports. There are 19 Classrooms provided with white boards, proper ventilation and lighting. There are 5 smart classrooms well equipped with slide projectors. The college has two common staffrooms for faculties with sufficient chairs and tables. Each department is provided with cupboard and rack for the departmental library and usage. The College library provides platform for teaching-learning process to both the faculty and students. The library is partially automated with KOHA software with 2.2.9 version. The library has a collection of 3000 books and provides adequate seat arrangement for readers. The college has separate infrastructural provision such as common classroom and girls' common room.

There are separate laboratories for Chemistry, Zoology, Physics, Botany and Environmental Science. The theory and practical classes for Home Science and Anthropology are conducted in their own classroom. These laboratories are upgraded with necessary equipment and tools to conduct the practical classes effectively.

The college has a computer center room where both teacher and students are accessible to use the computers. Altogether there are 20 computers installed in the computer center room. The college also provides wi-fi connectivity to the students inside the campus to improve their learning experience and to enhance performance which create an effective learning environment. The college Administrative office is fully computerized and well equipped with desktop, laptop, printer, scanner, slide Projector, copier machine, etc.

The College has a multipurpose hall for conducting the annual functions and various cultural programmes. The Yoga, Sports and Cultural Committee encourage the students to participate and allow them to perform in various cultural activities like Foundation Day, Teachers' Day and Yoga Day, etc., held annually in the college campus which enhance their confidence and give room to expose their talents and thereby improve the personality of the students. Also, the college through the NSS Cell represents participation in cultural programmes which are part of Youth Festival held in the University level.

National and State festivals such as Republic Day, Independence Day, Indian Constitution Day, Patriots Day, and Irobot Day etc. are celebrated in the college which helps the students to know the significance of these occasions. The college also observes the International Yoga Day.

The College has Red Ribbon Club (RRC) under National Service Scheme (NSS) unit . Youth Red Cross (YRC) and Eco Club are also opened. Blood donations, Cleanliness drive, World Environment Day and other social awareness camps, etc. are regularly carried out to make aware and feel the importance of social service towards the society. - The College campus is entirely wi-fi enabled with high speed of 150 mbps provided by BSNL and 150 mbps provided by Jio-fi to make extensive use of internet facilities for the staffs and the students.
- The College has a Computer center and an IT nodal officer is assigned for its maintenance and responsibility for the periodic up-gradation of the ICT resources.

The Principal is the academic head and ensures the proper conduct of all the academic, research and extension activities. Governing Body headed by the Chairman is the administrative head and nominates other academicians and experts to strengthen the functioning of the college. The components of the governing body include Principal, one member from Directorate of Higher Education, two representatives from Manipur University, one member from Donor family, two local educationist, one teacher representative and one representative from the parent teacher association.

The college has various committees and cells for the development and functioning of the college. - To educate girl students on many health issues and measures on how to avoid and overcome such issues.
- To encourage students to be self-reliant and economically independent through proper guidance.
- To create awareness programmes about gender sensitization through various activities like debates, quizzes etc.

Context: Being a girls' College, the issue of women empowerment are emphasized to its core. Different programmes conducted in the College stresses the importance of empowering women. Beyond the classroom, students are exposed to first hand experiences which promote the issues of women empowerment through participation in various events like Debating Competitions, participation in State Level Nupi Lan Day observations, Celebration of International Women's Day etc.

Practice: The Women's Cell and the Career Counselling & Guidance Cell have been working earnestly by imparting positive social ideas, thoughts and perspective on ethics and morality concerning women and other gender minority in social, political and economic representation. These programmes asserts a sense of responsibility and accountability through strategies, duties and roles that can be undertaken to bring about gender equality.

The following programmes are undertaken by the above two Cells to promote Empowerment:

2. International Women's Day, by Women's Cell, 8th March, 2018

Evidence of success: There is a shift from an emphasis on imparting academic skills to life skills that enhance the capabilities of the students to determine their life choices. The initiatives taken under this practice have provided a platform that allows confidence-building and a sense of familiarity with social realities that challenge the existing social structures and relationships. Therefore, this practice enhances the ability to influence outcomes and bring about positive changes by the students toward society.

Problems encountered and resources required: There is a lack of proper funding. There still requires frequent events/programs/workshops etc. to be held within and outside the campus as there is still a lack of understanding of its importance which augments the effectiveness of the practice.

Best practice 2: "Students Meritorious Achievement"

The objective of the practice:- Being one of the few colleges providing 'only girls' education in the state, this practice was put into place to encourage, enhance and ensure gender equality in the academic enrolment and achievements. The main objective is to motivate students to set their aim for higher academic achievements.

The context:- This practice came into motion in 2018 to date, to recognize and encourage outstanding students in various academic fields, under the collaborative efforts of the Academic and Finance Committee of the college.

The practice:- Meritorious Achievement Awards in the form of cash, certificates, medals, etc. are presented to students who excelled in the University Examinations, Inter college competitions organized by the University of each academic session annually on the college foundation day.

- "Sri (L) Sapam Nodiachand in Art and Culture & Sri (L) Sapam Ongbi Noni Memorial Award" in the field of Art and Culture, sponsored by Asst Prof. Sapam Neelima, Department of Education, SSGGC.
- "Smt. (L) Hijam Ongbi Selungbi Devi Memorial Meritorious Award" to students from our college who scored the highest in Botany in the University examination every academic year, sponsored by Asst. Prof. Hijam Anita Devi, Department of Botany, Vice-principal, SSGGC.
- "Sri (L) Konsam Ningthemjao Singh Memorial Award" for winners in inter-college competitions of Games and Sports, sponsored by Madam Konsam Jaboshakhi Devi, Department of Philosophy, Principal, SSGGC.
- "Sri (L) Thiyam Chaoba Singh Memorial Award" for students who excelled in the field of music, sponsored by Sir Thiyam Rockin Singh, Department of Geography, N G College.
- "Sri (L) Mairembam Modhu Singh Memorial Award" in recognition of students from the college

who scored the highest in English (Honours) at the University examination every academic year, sponsored by Sir Mairembam Chandra Singh, Principal, The Maharaja Bodhchandra College.

Evidence of Success: - The practice has shown its success as the number of students to hold positions in the University examinations for Bachelor's degrees has increased each academic session. The ratio of students hailing from the college in the top 10 positions of university examinations increased in courses such as Anthropology, Home science, etc.

Problems encountered and resources required: - The major issue faced would be the lack of sponsors, there are still areas where the introduction of such awards could bring about more academic achievements and motivation to improve students' academic performance.

Response:

Located in the Imphal East District of Manipur, Shree Shree Gourgobind Girls' College was established in 1985 providing various courses and programmes under the streams of Arts, Commerce, Sciences and Physical Education and Sports. The College is recognized under section 2(f) and 2(b) of the UGC Act 1956.

The primary aim of the college has always been to provide quality education in all aspects, academics as well as morals. And as such, the college supports practices that involve cooperation and coordination, unity, sportsmanship etc. This is evident in the amount of participation the college has shown, highlighting the capabilities of its students in the field of all co-curricular activities like debate, quiz, extempore speech, essay writing and in the field of sports as in inter-college sports meet, tournaments, etc.

The state of Manipur is known as the powerhouse of sports and the institute aims to harness the potential of young students interested in various sports activities by training them and encouraging them to participate in events at the College, University, State, and National levels.

Participation in extracurricular activities reduces instances of behavioral problems among students. This is so because sports activities require discipline in drills, practices, and routines. They impart a sense of
